Jason Kauppi was voted as Chairman, Michael Manugian as Vice-Chairman and Michael Bouchard as Clerk – all voted unanimously.

Mr. Davis will create a home page for this committee on the Town's web site. This area will be accessible to the public. It will contain minutes, documents referenced by the committee and other information as appropriate.

Mr. Kauppi read the charge of the committee as voted by the Fall 2014 Town Meeting:

"(The) Committee's Charge shall be to study the benefits, implementation procedures and issues, and potential problems associated with the use of electronic voting systems in an "Open" form of Town Meeting, and to make its recommendations, concerning electronic voting, to the Groton Town Meeting no later than its Annual Spring Town Meeting of 2015, which recommendations may include such proposed amendments to the Town of Groton Bylaws as said Committee deems appropriate."

Unanimous vote by committee members to accept the charge.

Mr. Haddad briefed the committee that the warrant for the Spring 2105 town Meeting will open week 1 of January and close the last week of February. Mr. Haddad suggested that a line item for electronic voting be included in the FY2016 town budget. Mr. Manugian suggested that a goal for the committee should be to have financial data available to the town meeting. Mr. Kauppi added that a reserve fund transfer could be request as an alternative. Mr. Haddad informed that the hard deadline for an article for the spring town meeting would be April 1, 2015, due to posting and publishing requirements.

The committee discussed goals.

- Answer the questions:
 - What would a town meeting participant want to know about the committee?
 - Charge
 - Who's on the committee
 - Why would the town want to do electronic voting
- What are the benefits of electronic voting?
 - Increased participation?
 - Privacy?

- Time savings?
- What is the cost of electronic voting?
- How accurate is electronic voting?
- What is the reliability and auditability? What are the metrics?
- What is the scope?
- Can there be exceptions to electronic voting (e.g. visually impaired) and how would that work?
- What are potential issues, and how would they be resolved (e.g. proxy voting, security breach, device failure)?
- Which of these questions are most important?

Wayland is a town which has an open town meeting and has recently begun to use electronic voting. Mr. Kauppi noted that Wayland will be having a public meeting about this on Dec. 11 at 7:30 PM at the Wayland Town Hall. Their agenda is:
